Fellowship Summary

Summary *

Intellectual property has evolved as an integral part of international trade. However, the extent of enforcement of Intellectual Property Right (IPR) varies widely and becomes a source of tension in international economic relations. Information and digital technology sector

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has been a significant driver of growth in GDP and employment opportunities. Thus it becomes imperative to protect this sector and countries often use tariff as a punitive instrument to induce IPR enforcement.

This motivates us to analyse a general equilibrium trade model where a country specialises and exports an IPR product to a partner country, where users engage in IPR violation, and imports a non-patented product from the partner country. Both countries produce a third non-tradeable good. The objective is to examine:

- (i) whether punitive measures like tariff imposition on imports of non-patented or an incentive like greater market access for such goods induces stricter IPR enforcement;
- (ii) which measure is more effective in reducing the incidence of IPR violation;
- (iii) the resultant general equilibrium effects on wage and employment in the different sectors.

Thus our project studies the interplay between trade and IPR enforcement policies in enabling private sector and human development. Interestingly, enforcement is also a priority area.

Fellowship alignment *

This is a collaborative project with Professor Rajat Acharyya from Jadavpur University, Kolkata, India. Rajat is a specialist in international trade theory and policies. My research specialization includes the examination of economic implications of IPR enforcement policies. Thus in this project, Rajat and I complement each other's research expertise in the two different areas and help to build long-term skills, knowledge and research link that has policy implications for both Australia and India.

Information and digital technology sector has been the driver of economic growth and employment in the 21st century. Its advancement has multiplier effects on other sectors as well. So it is important to incentivize the continued R&D in this sector through enforcement of IPR protection. Our project compares the effect of a country's various trade policies in strengthening her trading partner's IPR enforcement. From a country's perspective this is important, because it signals the intent to uphold property rights which facilitates trade and generates growth through the expansion of both tradeable and non-tradeable goods sectors which is a feature of our project. The general equilibrium structure of our project also allows us to compare the resultant sectoral effects on wage and employment and thus our project is aligned with the theme, trade facilitation, private sector growth and human development.

Our project is aptly aligned with priorities identified for Australia Awards, the Australian aid program and relevant DFAT country in the following sense.

(i) India is Australia's tenth largest trading partner and fifth largest export market. Bilaterally Australia seeks to deepen trade and investment links through a Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Agreement that could result in a net increase in Australia's GDP by up to AUD 45.5 billion and India's GDP by up to AUD 48.3 billion over a period of 20 years. Two-way goods and services trade between Australia and India totalled \$18 billion in 2014-15.

(ii) Australian investment in India includes manufacturing, telecommunications, hotels, minerals processing, food processing, oil and gas, and the automotive sector. Top Indian software firms like Tata Consultancy Services, Satyam, Infosys, Pentasoft, and HCL are represented in Australia and have a small but growing market presence.

(iii) To facilitate trade, both countries have strengthened IPR enforcement. Recently, the Australian government passed Copyright Amendment (Online Infringement) Act. India's National IPR Policy (2016) highlights the intention to fully comply with the World Trade Organization's agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights, and effective enforcement of IPR. Both countries recognise that there is a significant potential for further cooperation across a broad range of areas that include science and technology and intellectual property.

(iv) Australia has placed India at the forefront of its international partnerships. However, there are still major barriers to trade, like high tariffs on imports by India, despite recent reforms. Thus it becomes pivotal to understand the economic impacts of trade and IPR enforcement reforms that also has effect on diplomatic relations which both countries seek to foster through the signing of different treaties and MoUs.

Fellowship outcomes *

Education is an area of increasing importance to the bilateral relationship between Australia and India and they have instituted a program of closer cooperation on education matters. Since 2009, education ministers have met annually for the Australia-India Ministerial Dialogue on Education Cooperation.

The economics departments at Monash University and Jadavpur University (JU) Kolkata, India, have a history of sustained collaborative research. For the last ten years, as a visiting professor at JU, I have pursued joint research with their faculty members in the areas of law and economics, industrial organization and international trade, and the research has been published in a number of tier-A economics journals. Other faculty members and Ph.d students from Monash University have also visited JU for conducting experiments in economics to understand cross-country economic behaviour.

JU has been identified by the University Grants Commission (UGC) - the regulatory body for higher education under the Ministry of Human Resource Development - with Potential for Excellence and the Department of Economics at JU was among the only four departments in India that were given the status of Centre for Advanced Studies (CAS) in Economics in 2005 on the basis of research output of their faculty members. Based on academic and research achievements in areas like international trade, environment and the regional economy, the CAS status of this department has been extended further for the period 2016-2021.

While Monash University financially supports the faculty members' research visits to other universities, such support is either unavailable or quite restrictive for the

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JU faculty members. They predominantly depend on international fellowships like Fulbright Scholarship, Ford Foundation Fellowship, Commonwealth Scholarship, and Humbolt Fellowship for research visits. The Australia Awards Fellowships will provide a scholar like Professor Acharyya the opportunity to visit the Department of Economics at Monash University that can enhance research collaboration and improve the prospect of conducting experiments to study cross-country economic behavior. The economics department at Monash University is internationally renowned for experimental economics.

Such a visit also has the prospect establishing long-term research exchange programs between the faculty members and students of the two universities. JU was ranked 47th by Times Higher Education-Thomson Reuters among 100 best universities in BRICS in 2013-14, and ranked 8th in research and innovation in India by the Department of Science and Technology (Government of India) in 2016. So JU can be a rich source of recruiting high quality Ph.d students that can contribute significantly towards quality research. Professor Acharyya recently concluded his tenure as the Dean of the Arts Faculty. Therefore, his visit can also enable to widen research links in India through his academic connections.

Many academic members of the Department of Economics at JU have been the recipient of research grants from Ministry of Finance (Government of India), Ministry of Commerce (Government of India), and the World Bank. Establishment of a research link also has the potential to engage in collaborative research involving such grants. Thus Australia Awards Scholarship will enable the possibility of long-term research collaboration through different avenues.

Organisational Capability *

As AHO, Monash University has proven track records in meeting contractual and other program requirements for various major grant programs, including Australia Award Fellowships (since Round 3) and ARC. Monash is a Group of Eight (Go8) university and Monash Business School (MBS) is its largest faculty. It is one of only 1% of business schools globally to have the prestigious 'triple crown' accreditation. The Monash Business School has administered successful DFAT funded programs for Indonesia and South Asia, including Bangladesh and Sri Lanka over the past couple of years. Monash University is recognized as a leader in provision of support and resources for high-performing researchers because the university has established financial and management systems suitable for major project management. MBS, through its specialist centres and staff, has provided a range of analysis and support to externally funded projects.

Monash University staffs are governed by the Victorian OHS Act 2004 and its subordinate regulations and codes of compliance. She is committed to providing staff, students, contractors and visitors with a healthy and safe environment. The university promotes a proactive health and safety management philosophy based on effective communication and consultation, the systematic identification, assessment and control of hazards and the encouragement of innovation. The university has set measurable objectives and targets to control high-risk activities and increase health and safety awareness.

JU has been identified by the University Grants Commission (UGC) - the regulatory body for higher education under the Ministry of Human Resource Development - with Potential for Excellence and has been granted special development and research fund. The Department of Economics at JU was among the only four departments in India that were given the status of Centre for Advanced Studies (CAS) in Economics in 2005 on the basis of research output of their faculty members. This fellowship involves joint academic research with Professor Rajat Acharyya. The objective is to address the following questions.

- (i) Whether punitive measures like tariff imposition on imports of non-patented or an incentive like greater market access for such goods induces stricter IPR enforcement.
- (ii) Which measure is more effective in reducing the incidence of IPR violation.
- (iii) The resultant general equilibrium effects on wage and employment in the different sectors.

The activities involved in addressing these questions are as follows.

- (i) Specifying the formal model and the underlying assumptions.
- (ii) Specifying the social welfare functions of the countries in solving for the optimal trade and IPR enforcement policies.

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(iii) Performing the comparative static analysis to understand how the equilibrium findings respond to changes in different economic variables.

(iv) To seek for economic intuition for the results.

Given the mathematical complexities involved in such general equilibrium models, these activities will take at least six weeks. For the remaining part of the visit we aim to begin the formal write-up of the project focusing on the direction of the pitch of the project. During his visit Rajat will also attend departmental seminars and engage in academic and other interactions with faculty members.
